The appropriation of \$2,000,000 by the Board of Estimate for the Hudson bridge, over the Spuyten Duyvil Creek.

is a reminder that the three hundredth anniversary of Hudson's discovery of this harbor is not quite three years off, says the Brooklyn "Globe".

The Hudson bridge will be a permanent Hudson memorial, and it will be an important link between the upper section of Manhattan and the Highlands further up the river.

Its completion will open a drive all the way from Riverside heights and Grant's tomb indefinitely along the east bank of the Hudson through some of the most beautiful and most historic country on the continent.

But the dedication of the Hudson bridge should be but a small part of the Hudson anniversary celebration. That occasion should be made an adequate expression of the wealth, power and taste of New York.

Two of the Marcell pure elections bills have become laws. Governor Stokes having affixed his signature to them Thursday.

Under the first of the new statutes any person offering a bribe to influence a voter, or who gives money to any person to be used for bribing voters, or any person receiving a bribe to influence his vote, or employer who threaten or coerce in any way improperly influence his employees to vote, are one and all punishable by disfranchisement for five years.

The second statute is supplementary to the first. It defines the crime of bribery and prohibits the giving or agreeing to give any money or valuable thing to promote or procure the nomination or election of any candidate to a public office, or to give or pay, wholly or in part, the expense of giving or providing any meat, drink, entertainment or provision to or for the purpose of influencing any person to vote or refrain from voting.

Under the second act any person found guilty of any of the offenses described shall be disfranchised for two years for the first offense and perpetually disfranchised if convicted a second time.

Certainly these laws are drastic enough if they can be enforced. The crime of bribery is committed in every county at every election. In some counties it is estimated that fully one-half the voters are bribed and vast sums of money, aggregating from \$20,000 to \$50,000, are known to be contributed for corrupting the suffrage.

The empty form of a constitution has been given to the people, and the Tiers Etat has representation in a chamber that must impotently reflect the will of the Czar, and is subject at any time to summary dismissal or complete extinguishment. The resigned Russian Premier has not added anything to the laurels he won at Portsmouth. He is not a Neckar, but only a man whom the Czar has used and has now thrown aside as no longer necessary.

Premier Witte's resignation to the Czar is alleged to be on account of ill health, and it is announced that he continues to enjoy the imperial confidence, which is to be doubted. The course pursued by the Czar shows that the reactionary influences so bitterly hostile to Count Witte are in full control of the imperial mind and will dictate the imperial policy, says the Newark "Daily Advertiser."
