Dear Sir.—In reply to your request for my opinion as to the right of door-men to participate in the Pension and Sick Benefit account maintained by the Department and the duty of the Depart-ment to make deduction from the pay of the doormen on account of said fund, I have to say that in my opinion the door-men are entitled to participate in the ben-efits of this fund and that the deduction should be made from their pay on ac-count of this fund now as in the past. I understand that an opinion rendered by me as to the right of doormen to increase of pay under the Act of 1905, has given rise to the impression that the same prin-ciple governs the relation of doormen to the Pension Fund. The latter question is an entirely different one and is govern-ed by an entirely different law and my opinion in the salary case was not mend-ed to cover the question of pensions. I therefore advise you that it is the duty of the Department to consider the door-men as entitled to the boyefits of the Pension Fund and to treat them accord-ingly. Respectfully submitted.
