ED BULLINS, a TDR Contributing Editor as well as special editor of this issue, is Resident Playwright of the New Lafavette Theatre in Harlem. His plays, including The Electronic Nigger and Clara's Ole Man, have earned enthusiastic reception in recent New York productions at the American Place Theatre and the Martinique Theatre. LARRY NEAL, poet-essayist, has been associated with LeRoi Jones and the Black Arts Movement for several years, publishing in Soulbook, Black Dialogue, Negro Digest, and Liberator. With Jones, he edited a forthcoming anthology of new Black writing entitled Blackfire. BEN CALDWELL is a Harlem essayist-playwright-artist. His plays have been performed at Newark's Spirit House and presented on the west coast by the Black Arts Alliance, LEROI JONES, poet-playwright, leads Spirit House in Newark. HERBIE STOKES is a 17-year-old actor-playwright who has worked closely with Jones at Spirit House. JIMMIE GARRETT, 24-year-old former SNCC worker, is a senior at San Francisco State College where he was formerly the chairman of the Black Students' Union, JOHN O'NEAL is one of the founders of the Free Southern Theatre. SONIA SANCHEZ is a poet and playwright; formerly associated with the Black Arts in Harlem, she now lives in San Francisco. MARVIN X is one of the founders of Black Arts/West in the Fillmore district of San Francisco; his plays have been produced there and by the Black Arts Alliance. He has fled the country to avoid imprisonment for draft resistance: a member of the Nation of Islam, he will not make war on Asians. RON MILNER is Writer-in-Residence at Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. BILL GUNN's Johnnas has been produced at the Chelsea Theatre Center. WOODIE KING, JR. is one of the founders of Concept East Theatre in Detroit. He heads the Lower East Side Drama Program for the Mobilization for Youth in New York, DOROTHY AHMAD lives in San Francisco with her artist husband and two children. Papa's Daughter was produced by the Black Arts Alliance as part of Jones' "Communications Project." Her work has appeared in Soulbook and Black Dialogue. JOSEPH WHITE, a Newark playwright, has received a John Hay Whitney Opportunity Fellowship. His work has been performed by the Black Arts Theatre (New York) and by Spirit House; one of his plays will appear in the Neal-Jones anthology Blackfire. ADAM DAVID MILLER is an instructor at Laney College (Oakland) and a member of Aldridge Players/West in San Francisco. HENRIETTA HARRIS is an actress, one of the founders of Aldridge Players/West.
