That he has never traversed the Constitution. That the bribery, corruption, waste, partiality, folly, vanities of the last six years are all strictly within the limits of the Constitution. Therefore mild-mannered, peaceable, rightloving citizens have pronounced the word that this Constitution must go.

The authorities selected by the King during that period have very sufficiently proved, that though, as under the Kamehamehas, it may be worked for the good, yet under other circumstances it may be worked for the evil of those most concerned. The plea of all recent Ministries has been that they were acting within the scope of the Constitution. Therefore—said the speakers on Thursday—it is the Constitution, not only the Ministry, which must be changed.

The King may sit down at dinner with a Minister, shake him by the faith and ability of that Minister. while he (the King) has the dismissal of that Minister, already signed, in his pocket. Or a Ministry may defeat a vote of "want of confidence" in the Legislature, and be nevertheless dismissed the next day.
