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HER CHILD BURNED TO DEATH. Mrs. Schriber Went Out for a Few Minutes.

When She Returned Little Hattie Was in a Blaze.

A mother's unintentional carelessness caused the terrible death of pretty little four-year-old Hattie Schriber, daughter of the late Schriber, a tailor of 141 East Broadway this morning.

The Schribers live on the third floor of the double tenement at that number. The husband and father was at work and Mrs. Schriber went to the butcher shop in the basement about 9 o'clock, leaving little Hattie to watch her two-year-old brother.

She was gone barely five minutes, but when she returned she saw a spectacle that at first she thought was a joke, and then caused her to shriek with terror.

Little Hattie was rolling about on the floor in the hall before the door of the apartment, her clothing a mass of flames. Her brother stood by transfixed with wonder, scarcely appreciating the situation, while a cloud of dense smoke poured out of the door.

The other tenants alarmed by the mother's frantic screams and the increasing smoke, poured out into the halls and for a few moments a panic seized the building.

Those with cooler heads wrapped up the blazing little form and hurried across the street with the child in their arms.

Little Hattie's body was taken to the Madison street police station and later removed to an undertaker.

When seen by an EVENING WORLD reporter the parents were crazed with grief over the terrible death of their child, and utterly at a loss to account for the fire. Mrs. Schriber insisted that she was absent only a few moments from the room and never imagined that any accident could befall the children.

She uses only a gas range, which was not lighted, but she never knew Hattie to play with matches, but the match box was on the mantel over the stove and could have easily been reached by Hattie had she climbed upon the chair.

The neighbors think that the little girl started the fire by lighting a candle, and that she was playing with matches, but she was found in the hall for help.

FOUR DEAD BY FIRE. Whole Family Perishes in an Early Blaze in Cleveland.

Two Other People in the House Barely Escape Suffocation.

A Woman Possibly Saved by Attendance at a Late Ball.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 26.—A fire occurred about 1:30 o'clock this morning in a two-story frame building at the corner of Central avenue and Harriet street by which an entire family, consisting of James Shannon, his wife and two little boys, perished.

In half of the lower portion of the building was a saloon, owned by Shannon and one John McGinty, and Shannon and his family lived upstairs.

The fire is believed to have originated in the saloon. The members of the family were all probably overcome by the smoke before the flames reached them.

The front half of the building was completely destroyed, and the four bodies were buried in the burned timbers. Shannon was thirty-eight years old and his wife was thirty-two. The eldest boy, James, Jr., was six years old, and John, the youngest, four years.

Shannon's sister-in-law, Miss Sarah McGinty, lived with them, but attended a dance last night and had not returned when the fire occurred. Shannon's business partner, John McGinty, was his brother-in-law.

Another family lived in the rear of the building, comprising C. H. Babcock and his wife, and their four children. The fire did not reach them, and they escaped unhurt.

The loss by the fire on the building and contents is placed at \$3,000.

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The Duellist Who Figured in the Drayton-Borrowe Scandal.

Passes Away at a Resort Where He Sought Restored Health.

Son of an English Nobleman and Spender of One Big Fortune.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—It is announced that Harry Vane Milbank, the duellist, who gained considerable notoriety through his connection with the Coleman Drayton-Borrowe scandal, died on Monday.

His death occurred at Davos-Platz in the canton of Uri, Switzerland. The place is a favorite resort of the rich and the famous.

Mr. Milbank had been sick for some time and had gone to Davos-Platz in the hope of recovering his health.

He was addicted to the morphine habit and this helped to shatter his constitution.

Mr. Milbank was introduced prominently before the American public by his connection with the most unfortunate Drayton-Borrowe scandal.

He was the friend of Hallett Alsop Borrowe and would probably have been his second had matters come to a duellistic case. It was then that he met the daughter of the scandal, and did not escape treatment at the hands of press interviewers, humorists and cartoonists.

Mr. Milbank was reputed to have been engaged in a considerable number of duels, some reports putting the count as high as sixteen or eighteen. On each of four occasions he killed his man.

Mr. Milbank was an Englishman by birth, but he passed through the college days of his life in the United States. He was educated at Eton and afterwards joined the British. With his regiment he was sent to the Crimea, where he was present at the battle of the Alma. He was present at the battle of the Alma, where he was present at the battle of the Alma.

He owned race horses and was a keen sportsman, and was present with Gen. Herbert Stewart when he was killed.

He was the son of Sir Frederick Milbank and a grandson of Mark Milbank, who married the daughter of the first Duke of Cleveland. His sister is the wife of Count Kietow von Lom, a German nobleman, who is a brother-in-law of the Duke of Hamilton. The young man had spent \$300,000 a year ago and was not then possessed of a large fortune, but there then, probably, that with a share of the late Duke of Cleveland's estate, valued at \$2,000,000.

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
