

ANOTHER PLATT GRAB.

A Rider Which Will Give Him Control of Patronage.

Gov. Morton Signs the Rapid Transit Appropriation Bill.

Leader Foley Declares the New Bridge Measure a Steal.

ALBANY, May 3.—The Platt-Whitcomb rider has hit upon a new plan to get even for the defeat of the Charities bill. A rider has been tacked onto the bill introduced by Senator Reynolds to provide further terminal facilities at the New York end of the Brooklyn Bridge.

The scheme hidden away in the rider contemplates a change in the management of the bridge bill, according to the Platt formula.

It provides that the Mayor, Comptroller and Chairman of the Aldermanic Finance Committee of New York City, shall appoint two Commissioners to administer the affairs of the bridge, and the Mayor, Comptroller and Chairman of the Aldermanic Finance Committee of Brooklyn shall appoint three Commissioners to act with them.
