A Woman and Child Wander from Home and Are Lost for Two Days.

INCIDENT TO THE EVENING WORLD: HARVAY, N. J., Dec. 8.—There are grounds to hope today that Mrs. Leona De Fries, who was found nearly frozen to death in the Forsyde Woods, with her frozen dead seven-year-old daughter by her side, may recover and eventually be able to give some intelligent account of her strange wandering and its cause. She is, however, in a very critical condition.

It is a very remarkable case, and thus far inexplicable on any theory other than that she was suddenly afflicted with insanity. Thomas De Fries, the woman's husband, is employed on the Biscanok farm, near the R.R. station, a mile south of R. Harway. He reported to the police yesterday that his wife and their little girl had been missing since Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. De Fries said that she left home to do some shopping in Harway. Her husband knew of her intention, and that she intended to take the child with her. In the evening he became alarmed at her not coming home, and made a search himself, but without avail. He comforted himself with the thought that he had probably been induced by some friend to spend the night, and he went to bed himself.

When Sunday noon arrived with no news of the missing ones, De Fries became thoroughly alarmed and notified the police. The officers soon learned that the woman had been at the shoe store of Abram Turner, on Main street, Harway, Saturday afternoon.

"She showed her movements after she had left Turner, and found that she had gone towards Forsyde's Woods, the child being with her. Thoughts of the terrible tragedies in recent New Jersey history, in which unprotected women have been victims, caused the officers to begin a systematic search of the woods. The search was not a long one. In a dark spot, hidden by underbrush, they found the body of the poor little girl, still in death. She was frozen, and had unconsciously died from exposure to the weather.

Half a dozen feet away lay the mother, apparently dead also, she was partly covered with a straw hat and was unconscious. She lay in a cramped position, as if she had endeavored to hold her child close to her in an effort to get warm.

As soon as it was seen that there was yet life in the woman's body she was tenderly lifted and carried to a place of shelter. Examination showed that her hands and feet were frozen so badly that amputation seemed the only resort to save her life. She became conscious, but could give no account of herself or why she had wandered away in this strange manner.

She has been taken to St. Michael's Hospital, Harway, for treatment. The morning the physicians made another examination, and applied the poles of an electric battery to the palms of her hands and the soles of her feet. She declared that she could plainly feel the poles, and this encourages the belief that amputation may not be necessary, at least that a portion of the extremities may be saved.

It is apparent from her disconnected sentences that she is insane, and it is hoped that the will recover her mental balance. Her husband is almost crazy himself with grief at the calamity and the loss of his child. Mrs. De Fries is thirty-eight years old, quite pretty and is the mother of two surviving children. The farm on which the family lives is owned by Diederichsen, the contractor, who is now in New York City.

HIS FATAL KNIFE THRUST.

Young John Ferman Stabbed by Joseph Cartillon.

Between midnight and 1 o'clock this morning a desperate stabbing affray occurred between Joseph Cartillon, of 404 Carroll street, Brooklyn, and John Ferman, of 492 Carroll street. Cartillon is twenty-five years old and Ferman seventeen.

They were playing pool in a saloon kept by Joseph Blato, at 282 Carroll street. A dispute arose over the question as to who should pay for the game and Cartillon whipped out an ugly looking shoemaker's knife, sharpened to a point.

He made a desperate rush at Ferman and plunged the knife into his abdomen. "Oh, my God, I'm killed!" cried the wounded man, falling to the floor.

He was picked up by several other Italians who were in the place at the time and carried upstairs, where he was put to bed in Ferman's private apartments.

The witnesses to the affray did not think Ferman was seriously hurt, and neglected to send for a physician. At 3:45 o'clock the boy, Ferman, was taken to the Betsy Hospital. It was found that the knife had penetrated the abdomen to a depth of three inches, and that the wound was not serious.

The police then visited Cartillon's home and found him in bed. He was awakened and placed under arrest. On the way to the station-house Cartillon dropped the knife on the sidewalk, and it was found by the officers.
