

## MAN HUNT OVER A WIDE AREA

**Concerted Search for the Murderers of Watchman SHOT WHILE ON DUTY**

**Request for Capture of Two Negro Suspects Sent Out**

Portland, Me., Sept. 28.—Set upon by robbers while he was making his rounds in the hardware and sporting goods building of the Edwards & Walter company in the heart of the city, last evening, William E. St. John, 76-year-old watchman of the store, was shot and killed.

The body was found about half an hour later and within twenty minutes the entire police department of Portland, with the greater part of the 1st department, most of the deputy sheriffs of Cumberland county and about 50 citizens, were engaged in the most thorough hunt ever in the section of Maine has witnessed in years.

Two negroes are being sought for the murder of St. John, and request for their capture has been sent to every city and town throughout New England.

Groups of police were thrown about all of the railroad stations in 15 towns, and every automobile passing through the city was held up and the driver's name and address taken for the authorities.

Members of the murder gang when St. John failed to ring in one of his rounds, began an organized search for him. They were in the company were sent to investigate and, entering the building with the manager of the company, found the body lying on a landing on the third floor. There was a serious wound in the heart from a .38-caliber bullet and two other wounds in the arm.

Search through the store indicated that robbery was the motive of the crime, for several revolvers had been taken, one of them a very valuable weapon worth \$40 or more. St. John's own gun was not found on his person.

Dyer and Pennington yesterday took nomination papers to file as independents in case the city and town committees do not agree on a candidate, and Dyer announced he would run as an independent, whether or not he is endorsed by the committees.
