WOMAN DEAD, POLICE SEEK TO FIND HUSBAND

Blood trickling down the front door of an apartment house on Gillman street in Nashua, N. H., yesterday, led to the discovery of the body of Mrs. Orta Lord, 23 years of age, in the closet of the second floor apartment with a bullet wound in her head. Dr. William E. Reed, the medical referee and formerly of Saxtonville, said the woman had been dead more than 15 hours.

The police at once began a search for her husband, Wilfred E. Lord, aged 24 years.

Lord is in New York and failed to report for work this morning. At noon, it was stated at the factory where he was employed, he appeared at the office and drew \$15 which was due him. That was the last seen of him. From what the police could learn of the couple they were married four years ago and had one child, who is living with its grandmother. Some time ago, it was stated by the police, the Lords separated, but recently Lord persuaded his wife, who worked in a shoe factory, to live with him again.

ROUSES STORM IN CONGRESS

Plan to Sink German Fleet Is Called Childish

RESOLUTION BY LODGE

Asks By What Right Property Is to Be Destroyed

Washington, Dec. 20.—The proposition to destroy German naval vessels, and not allow them among the victorious Powers, has aroused general indignation among senators. A large proportion of them refused, yesterday, to believe the cabled information and declared an error of some kind had been made.

The matter was immediately taken in hand by Senator Lodge, the Republican leader. He offered this resolution: "That the Secretary of State be directed to inform the Senate whether the report that the peace delegates of the United States at Paris are advocating the destruction of the ships of war surrendered to the Allies and of the United States is correct, and if so, by what authority the delegates to the peace conference are demanding the destruction of enemy property in part surrendered to the United States."

Announcement was made by Mr. Lodge that he would call the resolution up for action at the first opportunity. The topic was not discussed on the floor yesterday afternoon and many Senators were disinclined to comment on it until reliable data is at hand.

Suggests Piece of Sculpture

NOBLE FIGURE OF PEACE

Springs From Out Clouded Battlefields in France

Mrs. S. C. Fuller, Warren road, is at work upon a piece of sculpture, the idea for which was suggested to her mind by the sudden ending of the war. The details are not all worked out yet, but the vivid representation of life that characterizes all of Mrs. Fuller's work is brought out in a manner that makes the observer share in the artist's inspiration. From the battle field strewn with dead and dying, with broken cannon and debris of the fight, rises a cloud, out of which springs a noble figure of Peace. The right hand holds aloft a large banner, in the left is the olive branch. The face, strong and spiritual at the same time, shows the suffering, agony and suspense of the years of the war, but with the exultation of the final triumph, and a clear, long look into the future. Mrs. Fuller's thought was to show Peace, coming so it did, suddenly, out of a cloud, as it were, when we had expected to endure some years more of war. In the dim confusion of the battle field here, and there a wounded man raises himself to look up and stretch a feeble hand towards the glorious figure, whose tree lines, flowing drapery, its abundant life and lofty conception of the whole, show in a striking manner the genius of the artist whose work

"FLU" BAN IS LIFTED TODAY

Board of Health Removes Restrictions After 3 Weeks

WARNING ISSUED

"Coughers, Sneezers and Spitters" To Be Avoided

The Framingham Board of Health has lifted the ban against public gatherings, which has been in force for three weeks because of the prevalence of influenza. The board gives notice today that theatres, dance halls, schools, public funerals, lodge meetings and all public gatherings, which have been prohibited, may resume at once. At the same time the board, through Fred S. Dodson as executive officer, warns the public against meetings and all public gatherings, saying that they should be avoided as persons "having a dangerous disease."

FRANK F. IRELAND DIES AT RUTLAND

Frank F. Ireland, formerly of Framingham, who has been an officer at the Rutland prison camp, died Thursday afternoon of influenza, at Rutland. He was 54 years of age. The remains will be taken to Concord, Mass., by Undertaker J. L. Norton for funeral services and burial at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon.
